BOMBINGS OVER GAZA

Strikes in the summer of 2014 caused damage estimated at three times that of the 2008-9 bombings



ifty days of relentless bombing over Gaza's civilian population last summer lead to the deaths of **2,310 people** and the injuries of **10,000 more**. Nearly 100 whole families were wiped out in strikes that targeted homes, schools, masjids and factories.

The bombings began in Ramadhan and continued for 50 days. The threats from the skies often hindered relief efforts during the emergency phase, but despite the challenges, Ummah Welfare Trust maintained support to the victims.

The emergency phase centred on supporting overworked hospitals and displaced families facing hunger. Alhamdulillah, with your contributions, several hospitals received equipment and supplies; and thousands of families received food or cash assistance.

A TRAGIC TALE

On 29th July, just after midnight, an Israeli airstrike on Al Bureij refugee camp **killed 16 members** of the sleeping Abu Jaber family.

Yamin and Jana, just 4 and 3 years old, were the only survivors of the household that night. The strike killed their parents, Sumayya and Ahmed, their sister Halah, who was just 4, their grandparents, five cousins, three uncles, and three aunts.

This is one of the more tragic stories from the many that came out of Gaza last year. Yamin and Jana were just two of hundreds of children who were orphaned in the strikes.

Ummah Welfare Trust is today supporting these children, who live with their relatives in Al Bureij. Their guardians are provided with a monthly cash grant allowing them to meet the needs of young Jana and Yamin.

ELPING GAZA

Rehabilitation efforts are underway to bring life in Gaza back to normal.

rior to the bombings, electricity blackouts in Gaza would often last 16 to 18 hours a day. This dire situation, however, became worse on 29th July 2014, when shellfire took out the territory's only electrical power plant.

The impact was huge. The pumping of water to houses was curtailed; hospitals, already straining against the surge of war casualties, had to rely on precarious generators; and bakeries, with their refrigerators now off, were forced to reduce their production.

Till today, power cuts across many parts of Gaza last up to 48 hours at a time, forcing many hospitals to cut back on services. To help deal with the problem, Ummah Welfare Trust is providing hospitals with alternative sources of energy and muchneeded equipment.

A NEW CHILDREN'S TRAUMA CENTRE

A new children's centre in Gaza will provide psychosocial support to children and adolescents.

he witnessing of violence and killing has left many children in Gaza suffering traumatic stress. This has overwhelmed their ability to function. Early rehabilitation is needed so that they can come to terms with what they have witnessed and begin living normal lives again.

Ummah Welfare Trust, with the help of local partners, is building a **new trauma centre in Gaza** that will support traumatised children and adolescents, inshaAllah. Once completed, the centre will aim to:

- Release psychosocial stress among children through counselling sessions.
- Train teachers and professionals to deal with mental health disorders in children.
- Provide parents with coping methods for traumatised children.
- Strengthen coordination amongst health and community services in Gaza.

SYRIA: A SUSTAINED RESPONSE

Millions of pounds were spent in the past year supporting refugees, the displaced and the injured.

mmah Welfare Trust launched its appeal for suffering families in Syria in April 2012. The charity has since spent over £10 million providing relief to both the young and old, amongst refugees, the displaced and the injured. Nearly £5 million was spent in the past year alone. As more areas inside the ravaged nation continue to be drawn into the conflict, the challenges faced by NGOs has increased. However, Ummah Welfare Trust has not let these difficulties affect its support for victims of the conflict.

SURVIVING THE WINTER

£1.5 million relief campaign helped families in Syria and Lebanon survive the winter.

Winter 2014 in the Middle East was one of the coldest on record. Millions of families, living in tents or damaged houses, faced freezing winds and snow without adequate protection. A massive effort was needed to ensure that they survived the winter months.

Ummah Welfare Trust's **Syrian** winter programme was one of its largest ever, bringing much-needed supplies to displaced families in Syria and beleaguered refugees in Lebanon, where women and children were freezing amidst heavy sleet and snow.

A HAND FOR WIDOWS & ORPHANS IN SYRIA

Monthly support is provided to 1,000 children left orphaned in the conflict.

s part of its relief policy, Ummah Welfare Trust prioritises widowed mothers and orphaned children. **Over half a million** of them are estimated to populate the many displacement camps in Syria today. With no breadwinner or extended support, many of them face huge uncertainties regarding food and income. With the surrounding climate as precarious as ever, support for these groups remains vital if they are to survive.



A NEW CONTAINER VILLAGE FOR WIDOWS & ORPHANS

After establishing the Ummah Camp in Idlib - a tent village where orphaned families were supported - **the charity has now established a 'container' village in Aleppo**, where a further **100 families** today receive support.

Families here, comprising widows and orphans, are given free schooling, cooked meals, medical treatment and new clothing for the changing seasons. Each home is a prefabricated container unit and is equipped with mattresses, fans, heaters, blankets and utensils.

MONTHLY Orphan support

Ummah Welfare Trust's orphan support scheme in Syria began with just 300 orphans. Financial support was provided to the guardians of children who had been left orphaned in the conflict.

The programme has grown in the past year. Today, **1000 orphans** across the country receive regular support, alhamdulillah. The guardian of each child receives a **monthly allowance of \$50** which covers the child's food, clothing and education costs.



FROM THE UK TO SYRIA

Half a million pounds of relief goods has been sent from the UK this year.

s the crisis in Syria continues, donors and volunteers were given the opportunity this year to not only help financially, but also with their goods and time. From Ummah Welfare Trust's office in Bolton, **four containers of relief goods** were prepared and shipped to Syria this year. Hundreds of thousands of pounds of donated items were sent, alhamdulillah. The items - which included new clothes, nappies, milk powder, toiletries, medicines and hospital equipment - were delivered to villages, refugee camps and medical centres inside Syria. This form of charity is more in keeping with the way of our predecessors, who would regularly give away their most beloved possessions for Allah's pleasure. Like them, Ummah Welfare Trust asks Allah to make us from those who are generous with their possessions and time. *Ameen*.







REACHING OUT IN IRAQ

£230,000 SPENT *in Iraq in the past year*

Thousands of displaced families supported with emergency provisions.

he war in Syria worsened an already-complex situation in Iraq, where a surge in fighting last year forced over 2 million people to flee their homes. Today's fighting, as brutal as ever, compounds the ongoing misery of millions of Iraqis who have suffered greatly in the past two decades.

Despite increasing difficulties, Ummah Welfare Trust continues to reach out to long-suffering families here. Through the past year, over **12,000 displaced families** from across seven districts have been supported with your donations. In the lead up to Ramadhan, nearly **2,000 families**, displaced in Anbar or Baghdad, were supported with food packages. A relief convoy from Turkey was also dispatched, helping to deliver vital food supplies to **6,000 displaced families in Erbil**.

For the winter months, nearly **3,000 families** in Khanaqin city, close to the Iranian border, were supported with food provisions; while hundreds of families in Anbar, Baghdad and Kirkuk received blankets and heaters.

AIDING REFUGEES IN CENTRAL AFRICA

£170,000 SPENT *in CAR in the past year*

Refugees fleeing persecution in the Central African Republic were supported in Chad.

hroughout 2014, violence in the Central Africa Republic (CAR) led to the deaths of thousands of Muslims and the displacement of over a million. Whole towns were cleansed of 'Muslim' presence by militia groups, forcing over half a million Muslims to flee to neighbouring states.

CAR is located at a migration crossroads in the centre of Africa. Bordering what are now six nation states, the area has historically seen huge migrations to and from its borders. The current migrations, involving Muslims fleeing killing and persecution, sadly show little signs of abating.

Prior to Ramadhan, Ummah Welfare Trust, with the help of local partners, provided **11,500 refugee families** in N'Djamena, the capital of Chad, with food staples. A further **5,800 families,** displaced across Doba, Bitoye and N'Djamena, received supplies for Ramadhan. Emergency food programmes have continued into 2015. Earlier this year, over **2,000 families**, who had fled to the Chadian town Gore, were supported with staple provisions. Thousands of more refugees are being provided for this Ramadhan, inshaAllah.

SUPPORTING THE ROHYINGYA

Rohingya Muslims in Burma were supported with nutrition, clean water and new livelihoods in the past year.

n Burma's Arakan province, more than one million Rohingya Muslims today live in apartheid-like conditions. Much of the province is a countryside of concentration camps, the grim result of a targeted pogrom which has seen Muslims killed and whole villages razed to the ground.

Ummah Welfare Trust has been administering relief in Burma for 10 years. Using a local network of people, the charity has maintained support to besieged Rohingya families in Arakan since the outbreak of violence in 2012.

In Sittwe, Arakan's capital, **three masjids** with ablution facilities have been built in the past year for families denied a place of worship. The salary for each masjid's Imam, teachers and *mu'addhin* is covered, alhamdulillah. The provision of food and medical aid is also an ongoing programme. Food packs consisting of rice, lentils, oil and dry fish have been **distributed to 3,500 families** over the year. A further **1,500 families** with young children have received milk powder, biscuits and medicines.

The breadwinners of **90 families** have each been provided with an industrial sewing machine or a rickshaw; while **50 hand pumps** have been constructed across camps in Sittwe to help families facing water shortages.

RESPONDING IN MALAWI

Health and education support was provided to poor communities in central Malawi.

alawi is one of the poorest countries in the world; its poverty severe and deeply-rooted. In recent years, Ummah Welfare Trust has been funding communitybased initiatives which focus on tarbiyah and healthcare.

In the past year, five nursery schools and a vocational training programme for young adults have been subsidised. Hundreds of poor children today receive a free education, while young adults are taught skills in welding, bricklaying and carpentry.

The charity is also supporting a mobile maternity clinic. The clinic covers six poor areas in Malawi, providing free treatment to children and expectant mothers. The clinic sees over 100 patients each day and has proven hugely beneficial, alhamdulillah.







FLOODS RESPONSE 2015

Powerful winds and rains in early 2015 led to flooding across 15 districts in Malawi. Nearly 200 people were killed and over 200,000 left displaced as powerful waters engulfed huge swathes of the country.

Ummah Welfare Trust responded to the disaster by providing 1,000 affected families with mosquito nets, kitchen utensils, flour and maize seeds. Relief efforts were coordinated with other organisations to ensure the maximum number of victims was reached.

New masjids have been built for poor communities in India, Pakistan, Somalia and the Philippines.

he masjid is the heart of the Muslim community. It ensures that the worship of Allah is established, His negligence is removed, and the education of a community takes place.

To help promote piety and righteousness amongst the believers,

Ummah Welfare Trust regularly builds and renovates masjids in poor communities.

Through your donations, the charity has built **17 masjids** in the past year, with thousands of poor students and worshippers benefitting, alhamdulillah. Umm al Mu'minin A'ishah RadhyAllahu 'anha said:

'The Messenger of Allah SallAllahu 'alayhi wasallam commanded us to build masjids in different localities and that they should be kept clean and be perfumed.'

KEEPING THE Ummah warm

Over 50,000 families were kept warm this winter.

he winter season compounds an already-difficult situation for many poor or displaced families across the Ummah. Inadequate shelter, coupled with higher fuel costs, means many families face the bitter cold with little or no protection.

Ummah Welfare Trust's winterisation programme spanned nine countries this year. The multi-million programme enabled **over 50,000 families**, mired in war or chronic poverty, to keep warm this winter, alhamdulillah.





WINTER EFFORTS This year

32,000 FAMILIES IN SYRIA

Families in Aleppo, Idlib, Deir Ezzor, Hama and Lattakia were supported with cash grants, blankets, mattresses, heaters, baby milk and clothes.

10,000 FAMILIES IN PAKISTAN

Winter fleeces were provided to refugees from Afghanistan and Waziristan, and to flood victims in Punjab and Kashmir.

5,000 REFUGEES IN LEBANON

Refugees in Arsal camp were provided with fuel, blankets and a daily provision of fresh bread.

4,000 FAMILIES IN IRAQ

Displaced families in Erbil, Sulaymaniyah and Diyala were supported with blankets, heaters and food packages.

4,000 FAMILIES IN PALESTINE

Families in Gaza each received clothes, blankets, a heater, a gas cylinder and food vouchers.

3,700 RECIPIENTS IN ALBANIA

Blankets and clothes were distributed to struggling families in Tirana, Elbasan and Leskovik.

2,200 RECIPIENTS IN INDIA

Poor students and families in Rajasthan received blankets and clothes.

1,000 RECIPIENTS IN BANGLADESH

Low-income families in Dinajpur, Panchagarh and Thakurgaon were supported with winter blankets.

overty and neglect in the Sunderbans, India, has allowed an underground industry of trafficking and exploitation to sadly flourish. The victims, in a disaster that has remained unchecked for many years, are overwhelmingly Muslim.

The situation has motivated Ummah Welfare Trust to begin the construction

of a hostel that will support potential victims. Once completed, the hostel, called the **Ummah Girls Academy**, will provide a secure environment to **300 underprivileged girls** from across West Bengal, inshaAllah.

TACKLING POVERTY In the UK

Ummah Welfare Trust has partnered with local charities to help struggling families in the UK.

he true extent of poverty in the UK is often ignored or, at best, underestimated. Studies show that an estimated 13 million people in the country do not have enough to live on. Low income, a lack of access to housing, and social exclusion, have all contributed to this growing problem.



Alhamdulillah, alongside local organisations, Ummah Welfare Trust has helped deliver the following projects in the UK in the past year:

Sehri packs and Iftaar meals for asylum seekers and refugees in Ramadhan.

Winter warmth packs consisting of scarves, gloves, socks and hats - for residents at care homes.

Regular hot meals for homeless persons in West London.

A NEW LIVELIHOOD In Bangladesh

Shelli Begum was one of several breadwinners who recently received funds to set up a new shop.

alking to local villagers in the shade of her well-kept stall, life was never always this comfortable for Shelli Begum. 'I had a hard life supporting my three children and sick husband, who has been incapacitated for a long time,' she recollects.

'My son and I would work as day labourers. Most of our small earnings would be spent on my husband's treatment. It was difficult feeding ourselves every day. We faced a lot of hardships which were made worse because of my poor health.'

In her village of Bamon Dighi, sister Shelli today earns a tidy income running a small stall. She is one of hundreds in Panchagarh who has received assistance from Ummah Welfare Trust to start a new livelihood. 'I was very fortunate to receive assistance from Ummah,' Shelli says. 'I had no capital at all and they gave me the money I needed for the shop. The sale proceeds from it are today very good. I can afford to send my children to school and get treatment for my husband, alhamdulillah.'

With nearly half of all residents living below the poverty line, Panchagarh is reported to be one of Bangladesh's poorest districts. Many of its inhabitants survive a rural existence working as landless day labourers or, if more fortunate, as smallholder farmers.

Motivated by the high incidence of poverty, Ummah Welfare Trust initiated development work here over five years ago. With **nearly £2 million being spent** in Bangladesh since, Shelli Begum has become one of the charity's many beneficiaries, alhamdulillah.

Shelli says, 'I wanted to live as a real human being. I am happy that Ummah Welfare Trust is coming forward to help the distressed, alhamdulillah. I pray to Allah to bring unity amongst the Muslim Ummah.'

£90,000 SPENT providing new livelihoods in the past year



Hafizah Molla was provided with an endowment of raw rice to help her start a new livelihood.

ife for Hafizah Molla and her seven children became extremely tough following the death of her husband some years ago. His death left the family with no support, leaving them to survive on handouts.

Recalling those days, Hafizah says, 'I could not afford my children's schooling. In the winter, they would shiver from the cold but I had no blanket with which to cover them. We struggled to eat even once a day. I could not provide my children with anything. I even considered suicide.'

The Sunderbans, in West Bengal, is an isolated and impoverished region where many Muslims survive a tenuous existence by fishing or farming. Ummah Welfare Trust, who have supported families here for five years now, identified sister Hafizah during surveys.

'I received genuine help from [Ummah Welfare Trust],' she says. 'I was given **900kg of raw rice** (15 bags weighing 60kg each) with which to earn an income. I began by boiling the rice, drying it and crushing it. I would sell this as animal feed.'

By also selling whole rice, Hafizah slowly started accruing profit. She says, 'I earned 250 INR a day selling rice and a further 60 INR selling feed. Boiling a bag of rice also adds 4kg of weight to it. This 4kg I would use to feed my family. Alhamdulillah I earned 310 INR and 4kg of rice each day.'

With hard work, Hafizah and her family succeeded in gaining independence. Alhamdulillah, her children today have regular meals and can go to school. 'I always prayed to Allah for help. I worked hard on what I got from Ummah Welfare Trust and earned money. **We live happily now**,' she says.

Hafizah finally advises the widows of this Ummah saying, 'Do not get disappointed under any circumstances. Keep your intentions clean and continue asking from Allah. His help will definitely come. We should always be prepared to work hard and success will come, inshaAllah.'

SHARING IFTAAR WITH THE UMMAH

Nearly 1 million Muslims were supported for Ramadhan 2014.

he Ramadhan food-support programme is Ummah Welfare Trust's single largest annual relief programme. The charity spent over £5 million last year preparing families for the blessed month.

Struggling families in 18 countries were supported with Iftaar packs, alhamdulillah. Nearly **200,000 food packs** were distributed, allowing these families to fast and receive the blessings of Ramadhan.

Provisions were allocated according to the differing situations in the Ummah. Larger Iftaar programmes took place in crisis-hit areas of Syria, Gaza, Waziristan and Burma.

Over 13,000 animals were sacrificed in 2014's Qurbani programme.

ith preparations starting months in advance, the annual Qurbani programme has assumed an important role in Ummah Welfare Trust's relief efforts.

The charity sacrificed 5,409 large animals and 7,404 small animals during Eid ul Adha last year - an increase from the previous year.

The animals - which included goats, sheep, cows and bulls - were sacrificed in 17 countries. Alhamdulillah, **over one million Muslims** enjoyed the fresh Udhiyyah.

ince Ummah Welfare Trust's inception in 2001, every single pound that has been donated has been spent solely on providing relief. Not a single penny has been removed for fundraising or administration costs.

HOW ADMINISTRATION COSTS ARE COVERED

- **Donations specified for administration.** The charity has a separate account for its administration funds to ensure the 100% donations policy is maintained.
- Income generated from clothing banks. There are over 100 clothing banks across the UK. Donated clothes are sold and the income is allocated to the administration account.
- Profits received from Ummah shops and charity shops. Ummah shops sell brand new Islamic items and the charity shops sell new and nearly-new clothing items that have been donated to clothing banks.
- Tax reclaimed from the UK government's Gift Aid scheme. This allows taxpayers to increase the value of their donation by 25%.

Surplus administration funds are transferred to the charity's relief account. Alhamdulillah, hundreds of thousands of pounds have been transferred here.

In recent years the money has been used to support the running of overseas offices, widows, orphans and the construction of an orphanage.
