THE CRISIS IN OUR UMMAH

Are We Being Punished? The wisdom we fail to comprehend.

The Messenger of Allah SallAllahu 'alayhi wasallam said: 'This Ummah of mine is one to which mercy is shown. It will have no punishment in the next world, but its punishment in this world will be trials, earthquakes and being killed.' [Abu Dawud]

He also said: 'The greatest reward comes with the greatest trial. When Allah loves a people He tests them. Whoever is content will win His pleasure but whoever is discontent will earn His anger.' [Ibn Majah]

Sometimes we may question the wisdom behind the suffering and trials in Syria, Myanmar and elsewhere. It is true that we can bring this upon ourselves due to our sins. However it is also true, as the authentic ahadith mention, that those who are most firm on their deen are the ones most tested by Allah.

The question then arises: is the suffering we see in the Ummah a punishment or a test? This can be ascertained by our response. If we become closer to Allah through these trials, then it is a test, and if we move further away, then it is a punishment.

Allah says: 'Corruption has flourished on land and sea as a result of people's actions and He will make them taste the consequences of some of their own actions so that they may turn back.' [Q 30:41]

In the short-term, the suffering is painful and difficult, but when viewed through the lens of the hereafter, our perspective changes.

The Messenger of Allah told us: 'On the Day of Judgement, when the people who were tested (in this world) will be given their rewards, the people who were spared will wish that their skins had been cut off with scissors while they were in the world.' [Tirmidhi]

Importantly, Our Role

The whole Ummah is responsible for its collective state. What we do here in the West affects our brethren in the East. Our sins directly impact and cause the suffering of others. Every sin has a consequence. Our sins are not only between us and Allah, but have a direct consequence on our families, communities and ultimately the entire Ummah.

Abandoning sin, abundant istighfar, renewing our tawhid, strengthening our acts of worship, not withholding the rights of others, building a strong bond with the Book of Allah and collectively turning back to Allah will help us overcome our challenges as an Ummah.

May Allah give us the ability to do so.

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ROHINGYA GENOCIDE Picking up the Pieces

Ummah Welfare Trust remains on hand to respond to the ethnic cleansing of the Rohingya in Myanmar.


In front of the world's eyes, the Rohingya Muslim community in Myanmar was massacred during 2017. A pre-planned campaign of genocide saw them suffer organised killings, mass rapes and the torching of their ancestral villages.

In less than three months, South Bangladesh was deluged with over 700,000 Muslims fleeing the persecution. Almost three quarters were women and children, many of whom had endured and witnessed appalling crimes.

Ummah Welfare Trust mobilised immediately to receive them, and since September last year, has helped over 70,000 families with your donations. Food packs, shelters, clothing, fuel supplies and cash grants have all been provided to help them recover.

The charity has also continued efforts inside Myanmar, in Arakan, albeit with greater difficulty. Cash grant programmes and subsidised madrassahs have helped abandoned Rohingya communities to maintain their autonomy, alhamdulillah.

Strengthening their Islam

Since arriving in Bangladesh, Rohingya refugees have constructed over 1,500 masjids, alhamdulillah. To help them practise their religion, Ummah Welfare Trust has paid the salaries of teachers in Bangladesh and Myanmar so that young children can learn the Qur'an for free.

Thousands of refugee students in Bangladesh have also been provided with Islamic clothing to encourage them in their learning, while thousands of copies of the Qur'an have been distributed across madrassahs and masjids, alhamdulillah.

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SEVEN YEARS ON IN SYRIA

Ummah Welfare Trust has spent over £6 million in the past year responding to the world's foremost humanitarian crisis.

Syria may be far from the headlines, but it remains the biggest crisis in the world today. For seven years now, a whole civilian population has been set upon - losing fathers, mothers and siblings; their lands and their homes.

The past year has sadly been no less distressing than previous ones. Thousands of trapped civilians in Ragga have been bombed into destruction, besieged areas such as Ghouta have been starved and killed further, and even more refugees have been created following a huge assault on Idlib.

Despite the endless tribulations however, there still remains hope. Thanks to you, Ummah Welfare Trust has delivered over £6 million of assistance across Syria in the past year, benefitting over a million of our brothers and sisters, alhamdulillah.

Your donations have helped widowed and orphaned families, as well as the many that remain trapped in besieged towns and suburbs. Hospitals, schools and bakeries have also been supported, bringing relief to countless Syrians in their time of need.

'Whoever would love to be delivered from the Hellfire and entered into Paradise, then let him die with faith in Allah and the Last Day, and let him treat the people the way he would love to be treated.' [Muslim]







A Chance for Syria's Orphans

As many as a million children have been orphaned by Syria's conflict. Though the fortunate ones have been taken in by extended family, others are being cared for by members of the community. The least fortunate meanwhile are living in temporary orphanages or even on the streets.

Ummah Welfare Trust's Syrian orphan sponsorship programme began in 2013 with just 300 orphans. Alhamdulillah, today the charity supports 3,000 orphans across the country. A monthly allowance of \$50 is given to the guardian of each child, helping to cover their food and education costs.

As the violence plummets new depths, the situation for Syria's orphans may seem bleak. However it is never too late. With the right love and support, these children can grow up to create a better circumstance for Bilad ash-Shaam, and for the Ummah as a whole.

Assisting Ghouta Under Siege

Nowhere in Syria has there been more at stake than near the capital, Damascus. Just 15km away, in Eastern Ghouta, a brutal siege and constant airstrikes have starved and punished over 400,000 civilians – at least half of whom are children.

Ghouta has been under siege since 2013 and has suffered the worst brutalities in Syria's war. Cluster munitions, napalm and chemical weapons have all been dropped here, leaving tens of thousands dead, and countless surviving widows and orphans as a result.

As the siege and air raids intensified through 2017 and early 2018, Ummah Welfare Trust responded by providing cooked food, clothing and winter supplies to tens of thousands of families. Cash assistance programmes also expanded, helping hundreds of widowed and orphaned families to survive.

Up until Ghouta's collapse, Ummah Welfare Trust was funding six schools, ensuring a free education for over 1,600 children. Though this blessed region has today been devastated, the charity will continue to help these, as well as Syria's other children, so long as it has strength inshaAllah.

May Allah give Jannah to all the innocents killed in Ghouta and across Syria. Ameen.

Hope from the UK

Clothing and other non-cash contributions continue to be sent from the UK for Syria's families. Alhamdulillah, eight containers of relief supplies have been prepared and sent in the past year, delivering winter clothing, hygiene supplies, gift bags and medical aid.

Filling a 40 foot container and sending it off can be hard work, but each shipment contains vital aid that reaches the people and hospitals within 6-8 weeks of being dispatched.

All of the aid arrives to Syria through Turkey. Once it arrives at Ummah Welfare Trust's warehouse in Sarmada, Idlib, a network of staff and volunteers are ready to risk their lives to distribute the aid to needy communities and families.







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HELPING IRAQ'S COMMUNITIES

Emergency assistance continues for suffering communities in north and west Iraq.

The costs of heavy fighting in Iraq since 2014 have been staggering. Thousands of innocent Muslims have been killed while swaths of major cities like Mosul, Ramadi and Fallujah lie in ruins. Over half a million survivors today live in crowded refugee camps with little hope of returning home.

The past 18 months in Iraq have arguably been the most difficult since Ummah Welfare Trust began work here in 2005. The charity however has been able to respond to Mosul's terrible destruction by supporting over 16,000 families during the past year.

Emergency food supplies have been delivered to over 10,000 families who fled the terrible bombings over Mosul and Tal Afar. Cash grants, fuel and blankets have also been provided to thousands of families in Baghdad, Erbil and Ramadi, alhamdulillah.

Rehabilitation efforts have meanwhile continued. Damaged masjids across Nineveh, Anbar and Baghdad have been restocked with mushafs, while Ummah Welfare Trust's vocational centre in Erbil continues to provide free training to hundreds of single mothers.

Your donations continue to deliver life-saving food and health supplies to beleaguered families.

Yemen remains not only at war but in the throes of a humanitarian catastrophe. Thousands of Yemenis have lost their lives since 2015, while over two million have been driven from their homes. An estimated five million people today do not know where their next meal will come from.

Yemen's desperate, and mostly forgotten plight, has compelled Ummah Welfare Trust to increase relief efforts here. Through the past year, the charity has delivered food and non-food provisions to thousands of stranded families in Ta'iz, Sana'a, Hudaydah and Aden.

With the war crippling many families' ability to earn, the charity has provided cash grants to hundreds of families in Sana'a and Ma'rib. Alhamdulillah, over 50 hifdh teachers in Sana'a have also been reimbursed to ensure that they can continue teaching children for free.

Health needs also haven't been overlooked. In response to the sweeping cholera epidemic, vital medicines have been delivered to clinics in Hudaydah and Tai'z. Generators for over-worked hospitals in Tai'z have also been refuelled to enable them to continue functioning.

WINTER 2017-18 Bringing Warmth, Saving Lives

Last winter you brought warmth to over 30,000 families living in broken homes or under open skies.

The cold season each year brings another blow to poor families trying to survive. The freezing winds and temperatures push up survival costs, leaving many of our brothers and sisters facing a life or death situation.

Ummah Welfare Trust always strives to prepare families for the winter months, and the past year was no different. Thanks to you, the charity provided winter supplies to families in nine countries, delivering over £3 million of aid in the process.

The biggest winterisation programme came in Syria where many were facing their seventh year of displacement. Here, food, fuel, wood and clothing supplies were delivered to families in Idlib, Homs, Dara'a, and to those in the besieged enclaves of Ghouta and Qalamoun.

Alhamdulillah, similar supplies were delivered to displaced families in North Iraq and Gaza. In South Asia meanwhile, guilts and clothing were delivered to families in Afghanistan, Pakistan, Bangladesh, and to Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh and India.

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SUPPORTING **OUR MOTHERS**

As the number of single mothers across the Ummah proliferates, providing them with the right support remains vital.

Cash Assistance Programmes

Across the Ummah, single and widowed mothers are the worst affected when disasters or poverty strikes. With no breadwinners or assets, many are often reduced to begging or compromising their honour just so their children can survive.

Since many mothers cannot work, and young children shouldn't have to, cash programmes are an excellent way to protect these families. The right amount can stop a mother from withdrawing her children from school or taking on more debt just to survive.

Thanks to you, Ummah Welfare Trust has supported over 6,000 single and widowed mothers through cash programmes in the past year. In the Middle East, South Asia and West Africa, impoverished mothers have received single or regular cash payments.

As wars and systemic poverty leave more mothers penniless and alone, Ummah Welfare Trust hopes to expand this programme. By helping our widowed sisters make ends meet, we can safeguard their Islam, family and honour.



Providing Livelihoods

Livelihoods and training are some of the best ways for single mother families to break the cycle of poverty. Livelihoods bring income, which brings choice. Choice to buy better foods, pay for schooling, get healthcare, and even to invest and earn more money.

To facilitate this Ummah Welfare Trust has expanded vocational training centres for single mothers in Pakistan and Iraq this year, and provided new livelihoods to hundreds of mothers in Chechnya, Bangladesh and the Philippines.

Single mothers need not be confined to the edges of communities. By educating them and improving their selfreliance, Ummah Welfare Trust hopes that they too can raise their children honourably, like the mothers of Imam Ahmad, Bukhari and others once did.

REVIVING THE FAITH

Masjids, madrassahs and maktabs continue to be established, ensuring free Islamic learning for thousands, both young and old.

Supporting Madrassahs & Maktabs

Madrassahs, along with maktabs (or kuttab), trace their traditions back through nearly a thousand years of Islamic learning. Till today they remain the single most vital tool for preserving Prophetic knowledge and cultivating it amongst the masses of the Ummah.

Ummah Welfare Trust continues to support and strengthen these indispensable institutions. Through subsidies, renovations and sponsorship programmes, the charity has helped establish tens of madrassahs and maktabs in the past year, alhamdulillah.

In the Philippines, Gaza, Albania and elsewhere, hifdh and teacher sponsorships are allowing thousands of children to learn and study Islam for free. The construction and renovation of new maktabs in Africa meanwhile is ensuring that the seeds of Iman are flowering in new places.

Madrassahs and maktabs remain integral to the health of any Muslim community. With the right guidance and support, they can continue playing an invaluable role in safeguarding the faith of young Muslims who face ever-increasing tribulations.

A thriving masjid has always been a sign of Islam's vitality. For this reason it remains a target for Islam's enemies, who in the past hundred years have closed countless masjids across the Ummah, razed them to the ground or changed them for other uses.

Building and preserving the masjid remains the Prophetic tradition of every Muslim community. Ummah Welfare Trust works hard therefore to construct or renovate as many as it can, thereby strengthening the faith of Muslims and keeping them connected.

During the past year, the charity has constructed 55 masjids, and renovated several more, for communities lacking the funds to build. Thanks to you, thousands of worshippers, young and old, enjoy a safe space where they can worship Allah in confidence and unity.

Each new masjid also runs a maktab, offering a place where poor young children can learn Islam as it has been traditionally taught. So long as young children can learn the Book of Allah in His house, then the future of Islam will remain bright inshaAllah.

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A HAND FOR THE UMMAH'S ORPHANS

Orphans across the Ummah continue to be given support to ensure they have the best chance of success.

Helping Children in 13 Countries

Never has the Ummah witnessed a greater number of orphans surviving across its expanse then today. Across the Middle East, South Asia and elsewhere, countless children have no fathers. Sadly despite enduring terrible poverty, few have helped them, consoled them or even extended a hand.

The noble values which Islam has laid out for the believers however can be understood by looking at the importance the religion has given to helping orphans. Taking care of an orphan is one of the greatest doors of good that the Shari'ah has brought.

As the Ummah's security situation worsens, and given Islam's lofty emphasis on helping orphans, Ummah Welfare Trust is working hard to give this vulnerable group a chance. Alhamdulillah, through the past year, the charity has expanded its orphan sponsorship programme to over 10,000 orphans.

Children in Iraq who were orphaned during the bombings of Mosul and Rohingya children in Bangladesh are some of the new orphans being helped. In Syria, Gaza and Afghanistan meanwhile, ongoing sponsorship programmes have expanded.

'Have you seen him who denies the (Day of) Judgment? That is the one who repels the orphan and does not encourage feeding the poor.' [Q 107:1-3]







Children here are given a high quality education, three meals a day, regular medical check-ups and made-to-measure clothing. Madrassah classes run each morning and evening, and so tens of children complete the memorisation of the Qur'an each year.

The UCA remains a seminal project for Ummah Welfare Trust, bringing hope to many of Pakistan's forgotten children. The charity asks Allah to make them a means of spreading guidance, and to be a gateway to Paradise for all those who gave them another chance.

An Academy in Wana

Following the success of the UCA, Ummah Welfare Trust opened a second academy in 2010 in Wana, a town in the forgotten South Waziristan region on the Pakistan-Afghanistan border. Alhamdulillah, this unique school provides a comprehensive education and full support to 430 orphans.



The Ummah Children's Academy in Pakistan

The Ummah Children's Academy (UCA) in Pakistan is a flagship orphanage that provides free education and board to over 600 orphans. Constructed by Ummah Welfare Trust in 2005, the academy captures the Islamic ideals of offering complete care and guidance to the forgotten orphan, alhamdulillah.

SHELTER FOR THE UMMAH



Your donations have delivered new homes to hundreds of displaced and impoverished families.

The home is a basic human need. It offers a family sanctuary and protection, and consolidates their social and economic position. Having a home makes it easier for children to go to school and breadwinners to earn a livelihood.

There are few forms of poverty more crippling than homelessness. Homelessness gives rise to loneliness and desperation. It threatens the survival of the family unit and is usually the biggest sign that a family needs immediate help.

Ummah Welfare Trust has in recent years been providing solutions to families battling homelessness or housing poverty. With approval from local authorities, and using communities' own labour, the charity has been providing cheap yet secure housing to poor families.

Through the past year the charity has renovated damaged homes in Gaza and constructed new ones in Pakistan, Malawi, India and the Philippines. Alhamdulillah, thousands of our brothers and sisters are today physically and emotionally secure thanks to you.

Before there wasn't a single person for salah. And not a single child for Qur'anic Ta'alim. Now there is a masjid and so there is salah. Between 60 and 70 children are importantly learning the Qur'an. My wife also teaches the women and girls which is helping, alhamdulillah.

A mother in Mangochi, South Malawi, who received a new habitable home.




